Latin text (BCP 363): Christ has died, Christ is risen, Christ will come again. Effective sung a cappella. The divisi into 8 parts in this anthem begins at measure 23. For a small choir it is equally effective at measure 23 to sing only Sop I, Alto I, Tenor I, and Bass II.

It can be especially effective in a processional to have 1 person play F5 and C6 handbells on dotted half notes for 2 or so measures before the choir enters, and continue through m. 22. From m. 23 to the end, the F and C bells of an octave lower and higher can be added, ad lib, in similar rhythm to the bells already playing.

Resources for English Diction and IPA Symbols

Marshall, Madeleine. 1946. *The Singer's Manual of English Diction*. New York: Schirmer Books.

Excellent reference for helping choirs and soloists with English diction. I suggest first working with the vowels, since the vowel creates the *sound* of the choir. The timbre and the pitch are greatly affected by the quality of the vowel. Since the symbols for the International Phonetic Alphabet (IPA) are indicated for each vowel, the conductor can help the choir learn the symbols for at least the vowels. There are lists of words containing each vowel, which I suggest can be rehearsed with the choir on a single pitch, a chord, or a cluster, to assist in forming good habits for each vowel.
